## **Multilevel Governance: a definition**

White Paper on Multilevel Governance (2009)

 Opinion "Building a European Culture of Multilevel Governance" (2012)

Definition:

- MLG as "coordinated action by the EU, the Member States and regional and local authorities according to the principles of subsidiarity and proportionality and in partnership, taking the form of operational and institutionalised cooperation in the drawing-up and implementation of the European Union's policies."
- A dynamic, flexible process with a horizontal and vertical dimension, which does not dilute political responsibility.
- Multilevel governance contributes to strengthen ties between territories and to overcome administrative hurdles

in regulation and policy implementation.

→ MLG as a key to efficient policy implementation and territorial cohesion.



## Promoting and streamlining MLG: the CoR's "Charter for multilevel governance in Europe"

- Drafting of MLG Charter requested by CoR White Paper to try and "incorporate a shared understanding of European governance into the European Union's core values."
  - Launched on 9 May 2014, the Charter is now open for signature to EU Local and Regional Authorities, which are invited to initiate joint projects and partnership in the spirit of multilevel governance.
  - All levels of governance, territorial associations and political personalities are encouraged to express their support and implement Charter principles
  - The Charter was drafted to facilitate the recourse to MLG by all potential users (horizontal and vertical dimensions of Multilevel Governance include RLAs but also civil society) and identifies concrete domains where the use of MLG could bring clear added value.

## \* Novelty of the Charter instrument:

- Charter is a non-binding instrument, but can be promoted as carrying a strong political message from Local and Regional Authorities on Good European Governance.
- By encouraging RLAs to exchange on best practices, the Charter and its dedicated website aim at creating a virtual community. A successful development of exchange activities could allow an extension of the CoR monitoring activities down from the European to the national and regional levels.
